

Amateur radio examinations: January 19th--but forms <u>must be in by December</u> 19!

Larry Edler, WB6MVK; Eddy Pollock, W6LC; and Royce Krilanovich, AC6Z, have arranged to give amateur radio examinations for all classes through Extra class (except for Novice, which isn't handled through the Volunteer Examiner program).

In order to take examinations, application on FCC Form 610 must be made by <u>December 19th</u>. Larry has the new FCC Form 610 (the old ones are now obsolete), and will send them for a SASE. His address is 102 Northrop Pl., Santa Cruz, 95060.

Examinations will be on January 19th, beginning at 9:00 AM at Dr. Edler's office at the Dep't of Education facility at 809 Bay Avenue, Capitola (next to the Nob Hill Market). Applicants need to have a \$4.00 check, made out to the ARRL, a photocopy of their present license. Anyone who has a certificate for code proficiency should bring that to avoid having to take the code test again.

Please pass the word to anyone interested in upgrading their license, but be sure to mention the December 19th deadline!
